INTRODUCING THE MERGE COLLABORATIVE

Welcome to our first issue of MERGE News, the quarterly newsletter for the newly created MERGE Collaborative. In 2022 MaineHealth received \$950,000 from the State of Maine to create the Maine GME Rural Education (MERGE) Collaborative with Northern Light Health, Central Maine Medical Center, and Maine-Dartmouth Family Residency program at Maine General Hospital. MERGE is a first-of-its-kind opportunity in Maine to develop new rural residency rotations at hospitals and community-based healthcare centers across the state with a focus on giving residents experience caring for Maine's diverse socio-economic, racial, and regional populations.

In addition to supporting residents and practitioners across the state, the MERGE Collaborative also will create a 'Rural Education Leaders Academy' for rural preceptors, an open-access learning platform for all interprofessional rural practitioners, and internship opportunities for current Maine-based medical students.

ELECTIVE ROTATION SPOTLIGHT: RURAL FAMILY MEDICINE IN NORWAY, ME

With a population of just over 5,000, Norway sits in western Maine's foothills and includes the beautiful Pennesseewassee Lake. Stephens Memorial Hospital serves this rural community as a part of Western Maine Health. The MERGE Collaborative is proud to welcome Dr. Laura Larosa (pictured right) from Western Maine Primary Care as one of our first MERGE Rural Elective attending physicians in Family Medicine.

Dr. LaRosa welcomes Family Medicine residents across Maine to join her for a 4-week elective. Residents should be PGY2 or above. During this rotation, residents will identify the impact of chronic conditions on patients in a rural setting, identify complex barriers to effective communication, identify barriers to healthcare access, and more.
