The first MERGE rotation was established one year ago in July of 2023. Since then, 39 rotations have been completed or signed up for in the coming months. Most participating residents are from within the state from one of our four ACGME sponsoring institutions. Starting this July, out-ofstate learners are experiencing MERGE rotations as well. These high-quality rural GME experiences have caught the eye of programs from around the country. MERGE partners will host learners from New England states such as Vermont, New Hampshire, and Rhode Island in the coming months. Some residents will come from even farther away from New York City and Western Michigan programs.

These opportunities were selected by the learners and their advisors after visiting our MERGE Website and reviewing the catalog of MERGE Elective opportunities. Some have chosen Maine for their elective time because they have family in the state. Others have a passion for rural medicine and have seen how much our state offers. No matter their motivation, we are thrilled to welcome these new physicians into our communities.

#### SPOTLIGHT: OB/GYN IN NORWAY, ME

Access to obstetric care is one of the greatest healthcare challenges facing rural Maine. We hear stories every day of expectant mothers driving hours in each direction to receive prenatal care. Just last month we learned of an Aroostook County resident requiring specialty care and flying to Boston for regular appointments. It is critical that our next generation of Ob/Gyn physicians are prepared for the challenges of caring for a rural population. For this reason, MERGE is thrilled to offer

Stephens Memorial Hospital Norway, ME Dr. Andrews completed her Ob/Gyn training in Washington D.C. at the Uniformed Services Residency in Ob/Gyn. During her time at Stephens Memorial, Dr. Andrews has worked with the Maine Medical Center

Ob/Gyn Residency Program to propose a "Rural Ob Concentration" for Ob/Gyn residents. Dr. Andrews is a member of the MERGE Rural Education and Leaders Academy where her scholarly project defines the unique skills

that rural Ob/Gyn faculty need to teach residents in rural procedures.

Earlier this year, Dr. Jaclyn Israel (Family Medicine PGY3) from Central Maine Medical Center had the opportunity to participate in this rural elective. Speaking of her time in Norway, Dr. Israel said, "This was the epitome of what a rural OBGYN experience should be for learners. In just two weeks, I was able

to experience continuity of care across the outpatient and inpatient settings, gain experience in routine pre-/perinatal care, and navigate significant clinical complications. Beyond that, working 1-on-1 with Dr. Andrews was a great learning experience and she immediately made me feel like part of the team." Dr. Israel plans to continue her work in Rural Maine this September in her new position at Reddington Fairview General Hospital in Skowhegan.
